

### Many at Funeral Of Mrs. Carpenter In Toledo Friday

Toledo, Feb. 5.—Funeral services for Mrs. Clara H. Carpenter were held at the Presbyterian church Friday, there being a large attendance. Clara H. Sherman was born in Harrisburg, Ill. in 1860; died January 28, 1930, aged 69 years, 6 months and 10 days. When a child she moved with her parents to Hebron, Neb. She was united in marriage to Edward F. Carpenter at Belleville, Kans. Shortly after their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter started for Toledo, going by rail to San Francisco and from there to Portland by boat, thence to Toledo on the old steamer Toledo. They took up a homestead

on Salmon creek, the present John Williams farm. Mr. Carpenter taught the Ebonia school, the school house being a log structure that stood on the point of the hill just north of the railroad trestle that crosses the Pacific highway south of town. Later he served as deputy sheriff under Edward Deggeler. At the end of Mr. Deggeler's term, Mr. Carpenter was elected sheriff, serving two terms. He and Mrs. Carpenter returned later to Toledo where soon afterwards he was appointed postmaster and served in the capacity for years—until his death. Mrs. Carpenter was a charter member of the Chehalis and Eastern Star lodges of Chehalis, a member of the Women's Relief Corps of Phil Kearney Post No. 6 of Toledo and a member of the Adventist church. She is survived by one son, J. S. Carpenter of Portland; a brother, H. F. Sherman of Elma; a grandson, James Edward of Portland; a nephew, T. V. Carpenter of Toledo, to whom Mrs. Carpenter had been almost like a mother, he for 18 years having made his home with her; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Mary Moore of Tacoma; also a niece and three nephews in Tacoma and many other relatives in the east. Rev. McNay of Centralia officiated at the funeral services. Burial was in the Toledo cemetery by the remains of Mr. Carpenter.
