

### URGES ENLARGEMENT OF STATE HOSPITALS

helped if the state but had the proper facilities. However, only two hospitals in the state are open to patients for free treatment, the Farmington Home, just out of Detroit, and the state hospital at Ann Arbor, which for lack of funds, is still unfinished.

"With these two hospitals crowded to capacity, only 600 children can be cared for in a year and until some relief is obtained comparatively little progress can be made."  
Mr. Van de Walker said it is estimated about 90 percent of the children taken to these institutions would not have to remain a great length of time after the operations and in order to make way for more, a plan has been formulated whereby, after receiving the necessary treatment, they could be dismissed from the hospitals and taken to a "health center" where, under the care of an orthopedic nurse, continued care could be administered during their convalescence.

A bill is now being carefully drawn to present before the coming legislature asking not only for haste in the completion of the hospital at Ann Arbor but for an appropriation to establish these health centers. It is the plan to have a teacher placed in each center to assist in the education of the little patients and prepare them to make their own way or materially assist in their support when cured.

Leading educators, business and professional men in the state are behind this plan for relief, Mr. Van de Walker said in closing, and he urged the Rotarians to support the movement.  
Norman B. Horton, recently elected state senator from this dis-

trict, and R. W. Freese, representative-elect to the state legislature, who were guests of the club spoke briefly, both expressing their willingness to support such measures as those in the coming session of the legislature referred to.

### FORMER MEDINA RESIDENT EXPIRES AT BIRMINGHAM

Coleman Williams, Post and Prohibitionist, Dies at 83; Was Oak Grove Academy Student

HUDSON, Mich., Nov. 17.—Coleman Williams, aged 83 years, a former resident of Medina township, died Wednesday night at his home in Birmingham, Mich., according to word received here by friends. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Harry Allen of Moroni, and a nephew, Harry Allen. The funeral services will be held at the home in Birmingham Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock with the burial in the cemetery at that place.  
Mr. Williams was one of the first students at the old Oak Grove Academy at Medina, and as long as his health permitted attended the annual reunions of the pupils of the school. He possessed poetic talent and always had a new poem to read at the reunion. His poems were sought by others for reunions and other gatherings, also.

The deceased was a graduate of the Normal school at Ypsilanti and for many years was a school teacher. He also conducted singing schools in the county during his early life. He taught at one time in the Hudson school. From Hudson he went to Brooklyn, Mich., and from there to Birmingham, where he had since resided. He was an ardent supporter of the cause of prohibition and spoke and wrote extensively in favor of the movement. At one time he ran for Congress in the state on the Prohibition ticket.

### THOMAS J. ALBEE, AGED 86, DIED THIS MORNING

Was Veteran of the Civil War; Funeral Services Saturday Morning

Thomas J. Albee, aged 86 years, died this morning at the residence of Mrs. H. A. Rockwood, 325 North McKenzie street, where he and Mrs. Albee had made their home for the last two years.

He was born April 10, 1836, in New York and came to this county when he was a young man and lived here for many years. Later with his family he moved to Oak Park, Ill., where he lived for 15 years.

Mr. Albee was a Civil War veteran. He was a charter member of Circle Lodge, P. and A. M., and Circle Chapter, B. A. M., and also a charter member of Sycamore Lodge, I. O. O. F., of Sycamore, Ill.

He is survived by his widow and one son, George Albee of Chicago, who was called here by his father's death.  
Short funeral services are to be held at 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning at the Everlas undertaking rooms and the body is to be taken to Oak Park where the burial is to be made with Masonic ceremony.
